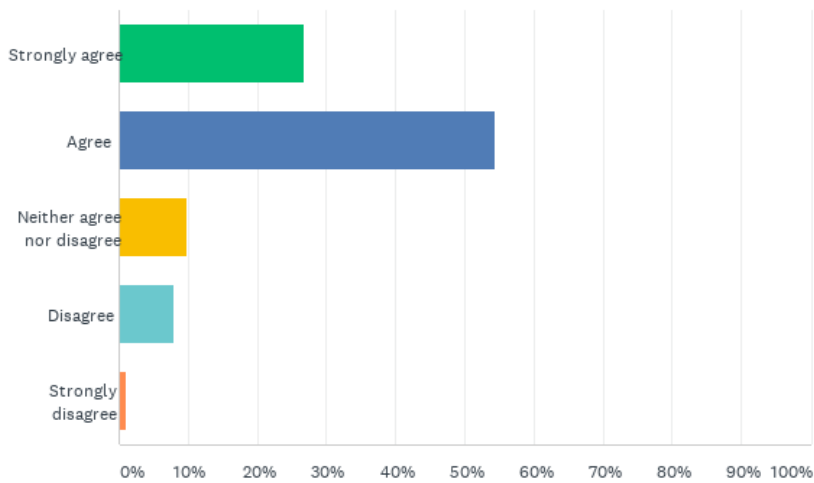


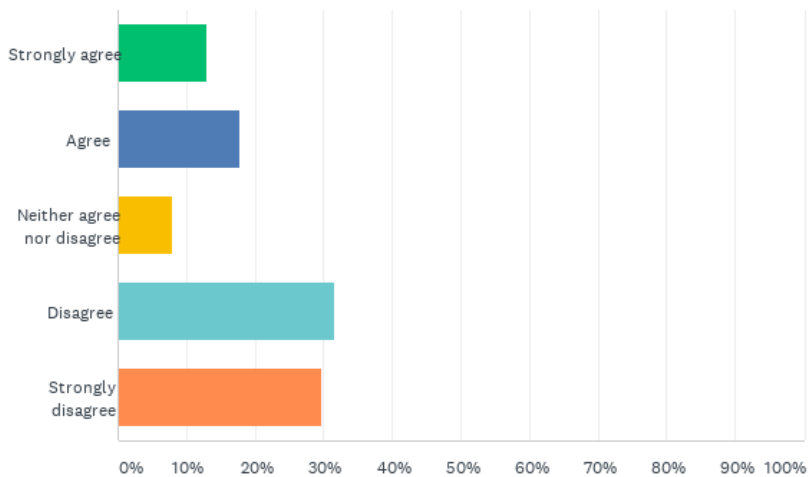

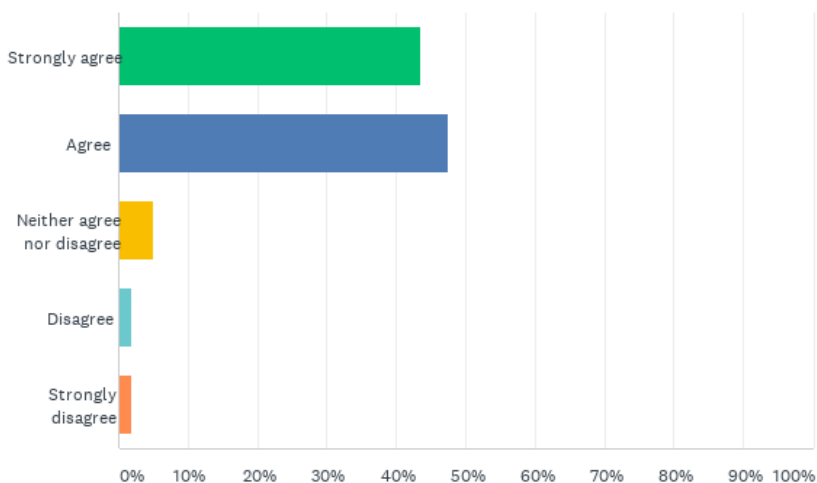
Q1 My child has an area at home where they can focus on school work.



Q2 My child has limited access to a computer or tablet at home to do school work.



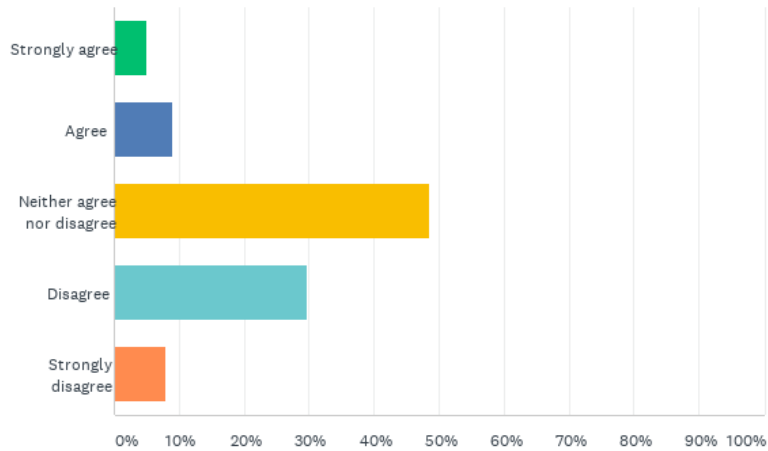
Q3 My child has access to internet connection that's fast enough to stream videos.



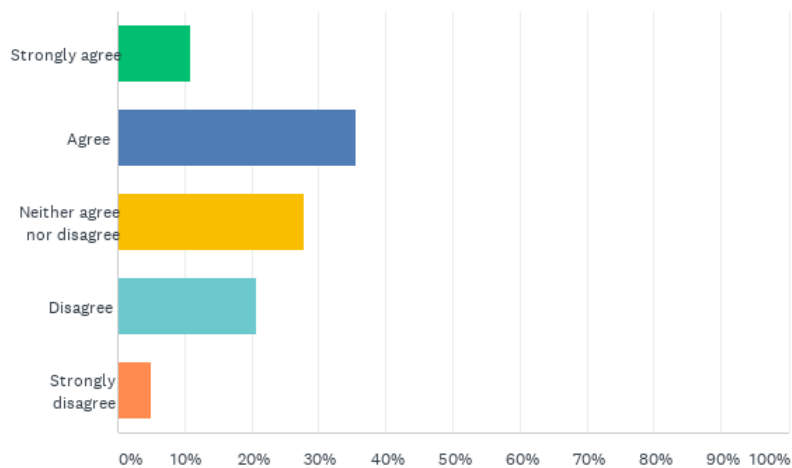

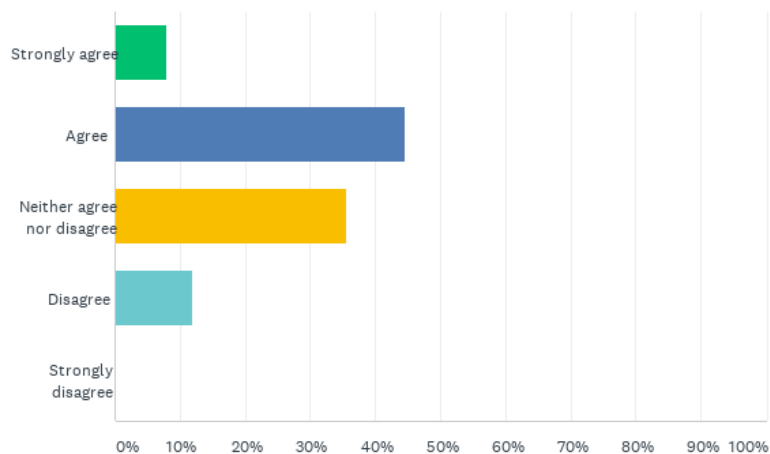
Q4 In the previous lock down, my child spent too much time on a screen for learning.



Q5 In the previous lock down, my child completed all their school work in the set time allocated.



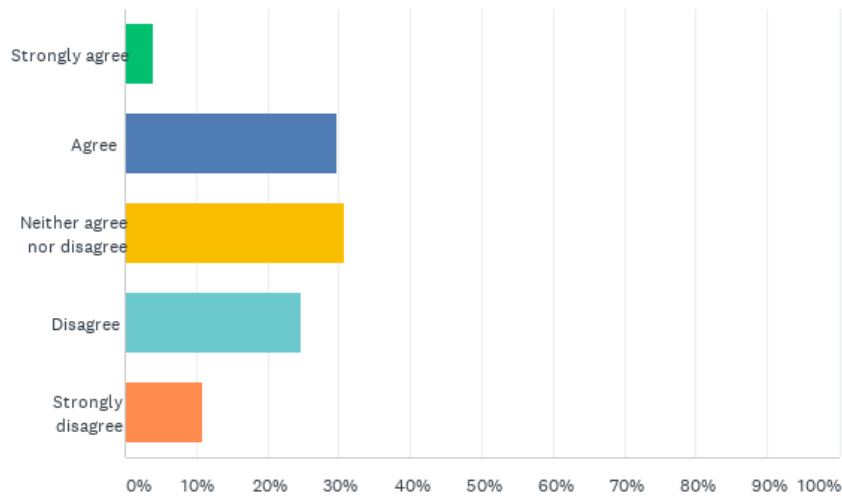
Q6 In the previous lock down, my child received the right amount of school work to complete.



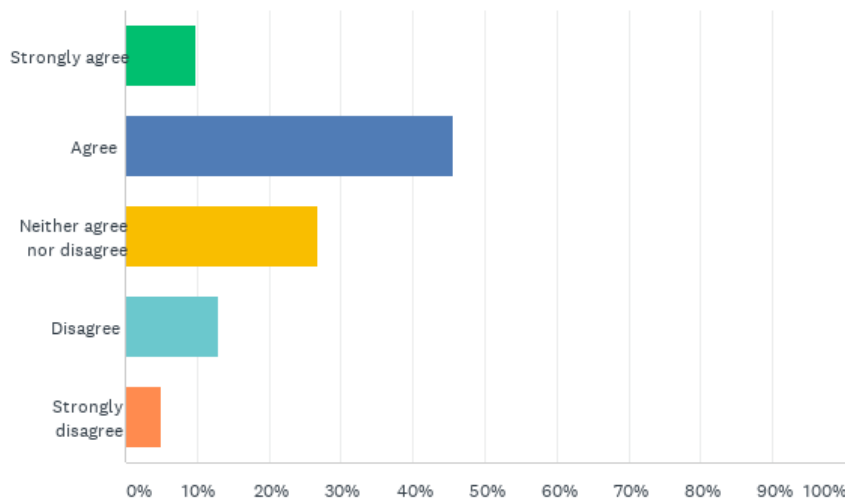

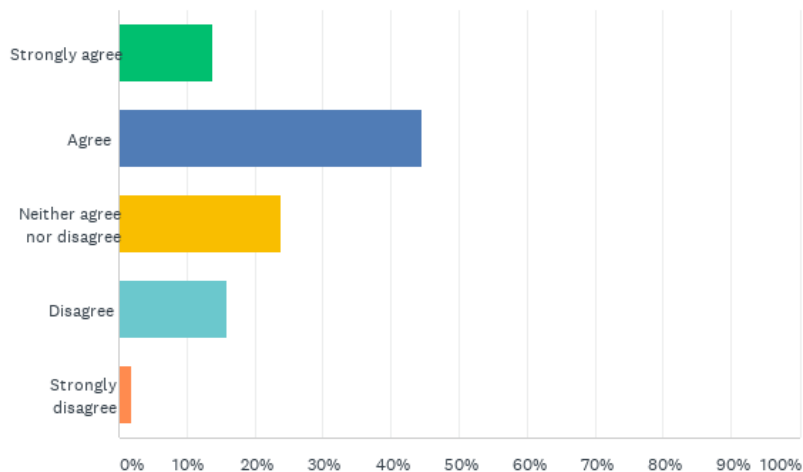
Q7 My child is copes well working in the home environment.

Suggestions from parents:

- Zoom meetings
 - Boost well-being and motivation
